FOUNDATIONS OF CHURCH LEADERSHIP

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INTRODUCTION

Leadership is one of the greatest responsibilities God can entrust to a person. Throughout the Bible, whenever God desired to deliver, guide, restore, or build His people, He raised leaders. God used Moses to deliver Israel, Joshua to lead the nation into the Promised Land, Nehemiah to rebuild Jerusalem, and the disciples to spread the Gospel to the world.

The church today still needs leaders who are:

- Spirit-filled,
- Faithful,
- Humble,
- Wise,
- Prayerful,
- And committed to God's purpose.

Church leadership is not about titles, popularity, or control. True leadership is influence, responsibility, service, and sacrifice. A godly leader points people to Christ and helps them grow spiritually.

Leadership can either build lives or destroy them. Strong leadership brings revival, unity, growth, and spiritual maturity, while poor leadership brings confusion, division, and weakness.

This lesson is designed to equip believers and ministry workers with biblical principles for effective church leadership. Every leader must understand that before God uses a person publicly, He first develops them privately.

CHAPTER 1: UNDERSTANDING BIBLICAL LEADERSHIP

What Is Leadership?

Leadership is the ability to influence people toward God's purpose. It is guiding people in a direction that honours God and helps them grow spiritually, morally, and emotionally.

- Desire for recognition.

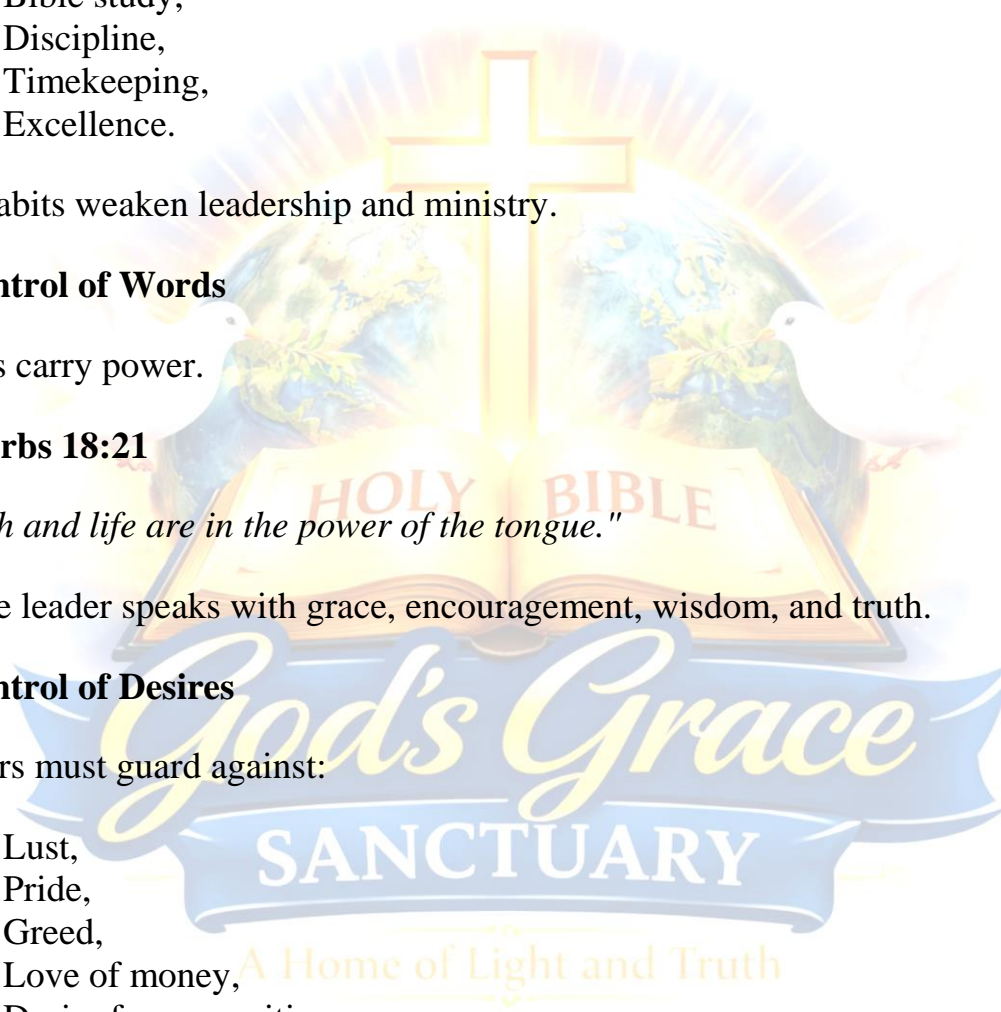
Leadership requires purity and submission to the Holy Spirit.

Jesus taught that sinful thoughts eventually lead to sinful actions.

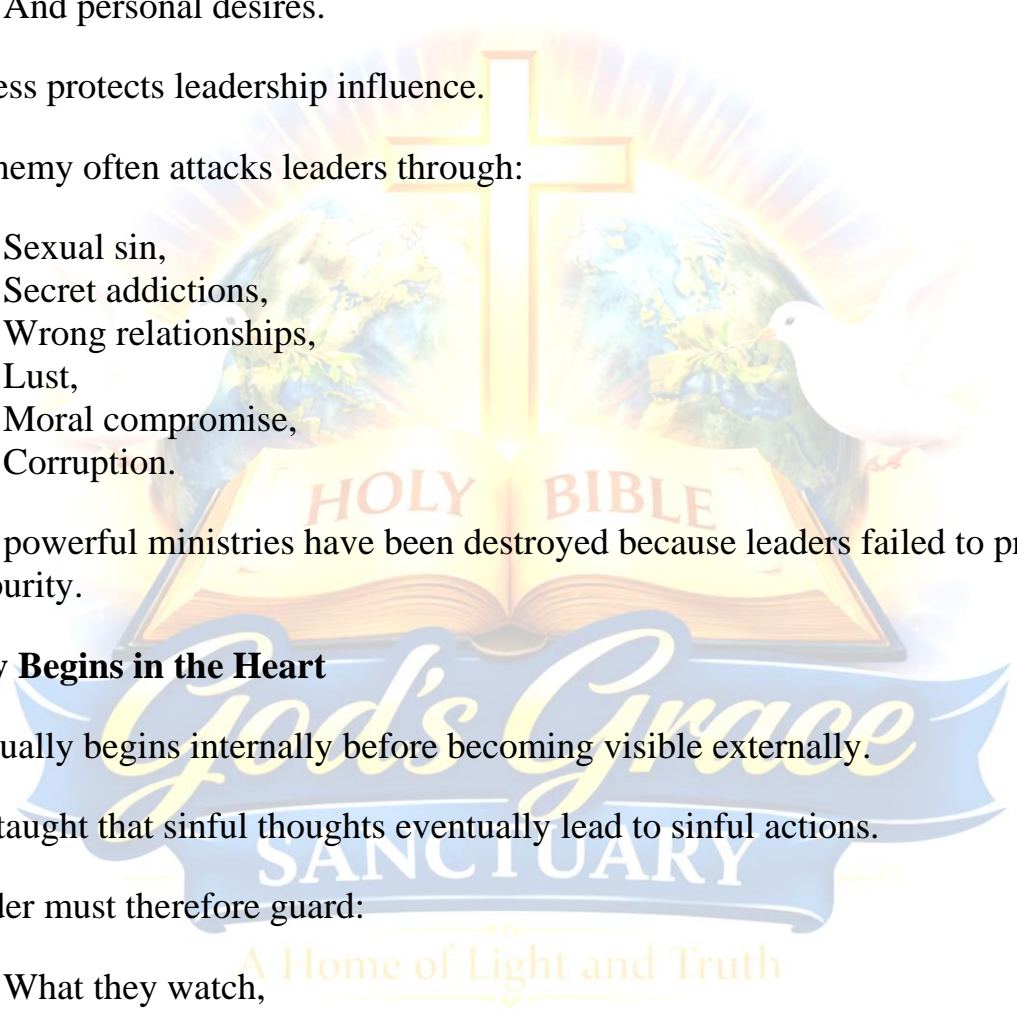
A leader must therefore guard:

Wisdom teaches leaders:

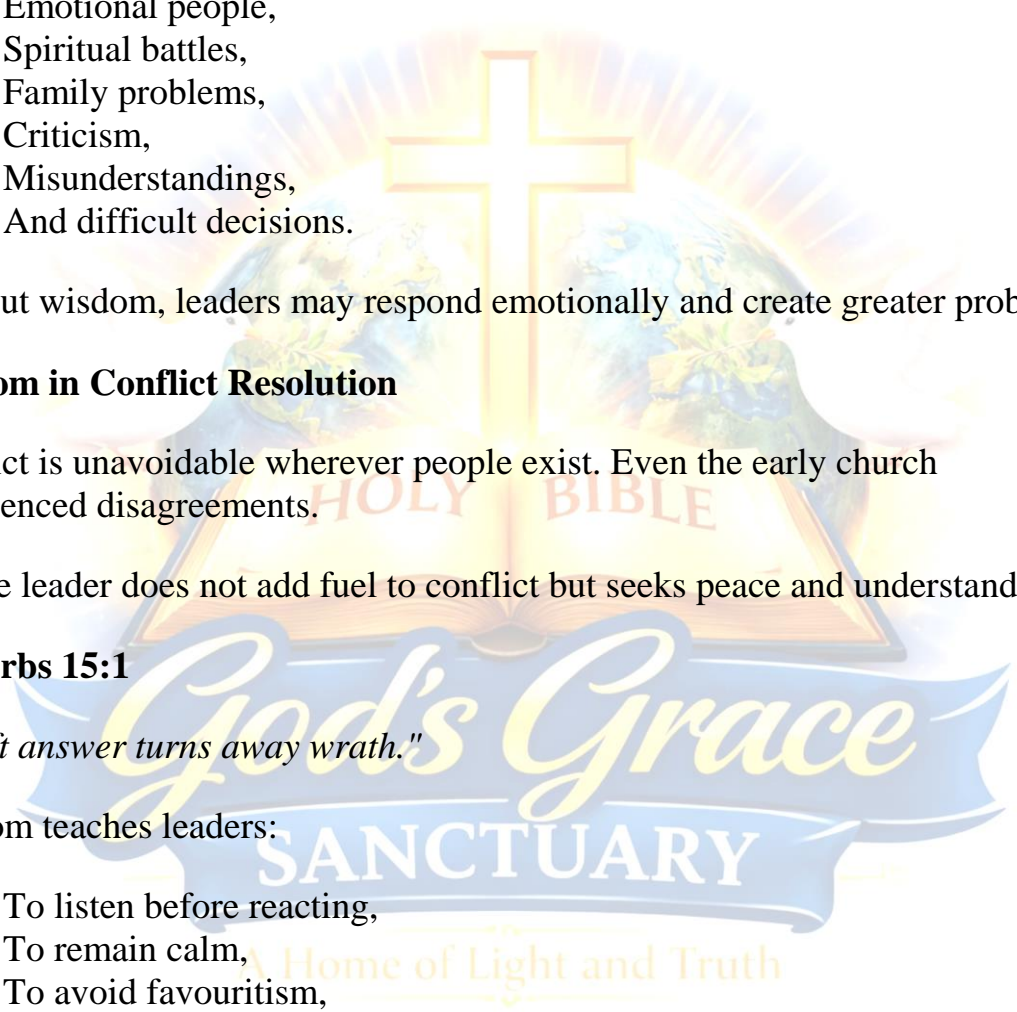
- To listen before reacting,

- And strong relationships.

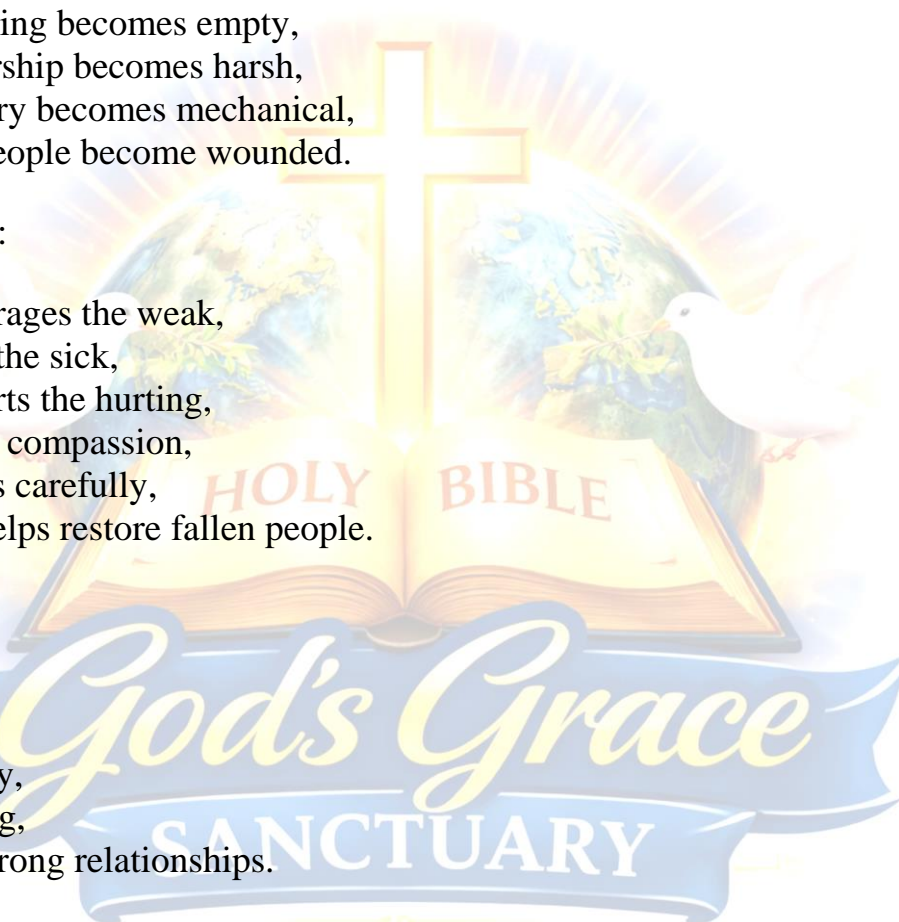
Compassion in Leadership

CHAPTER 9: LEADERSHIP REQUIRES COURAGE

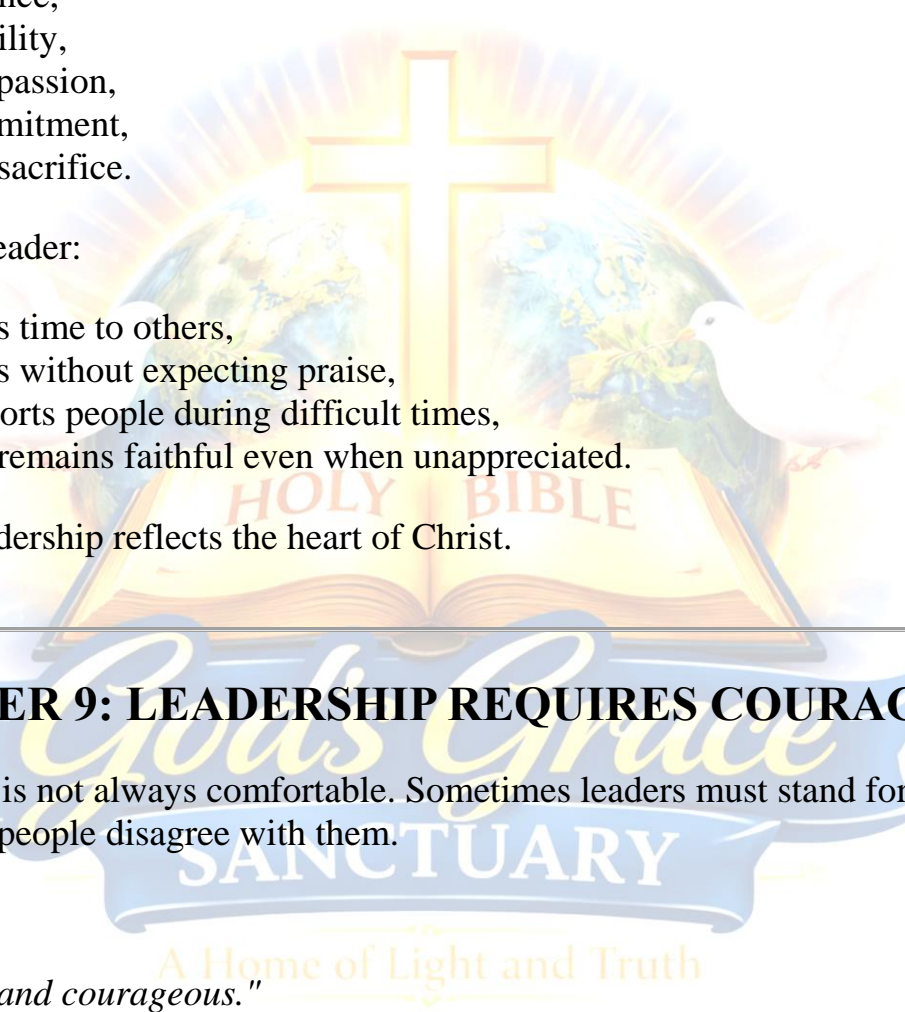
Leadership is not always comfortable. Sometimes leaders must stand for truth even when people disagree with them.

Wise leaders remain accountable to trusted spiritual mentors and leaders.

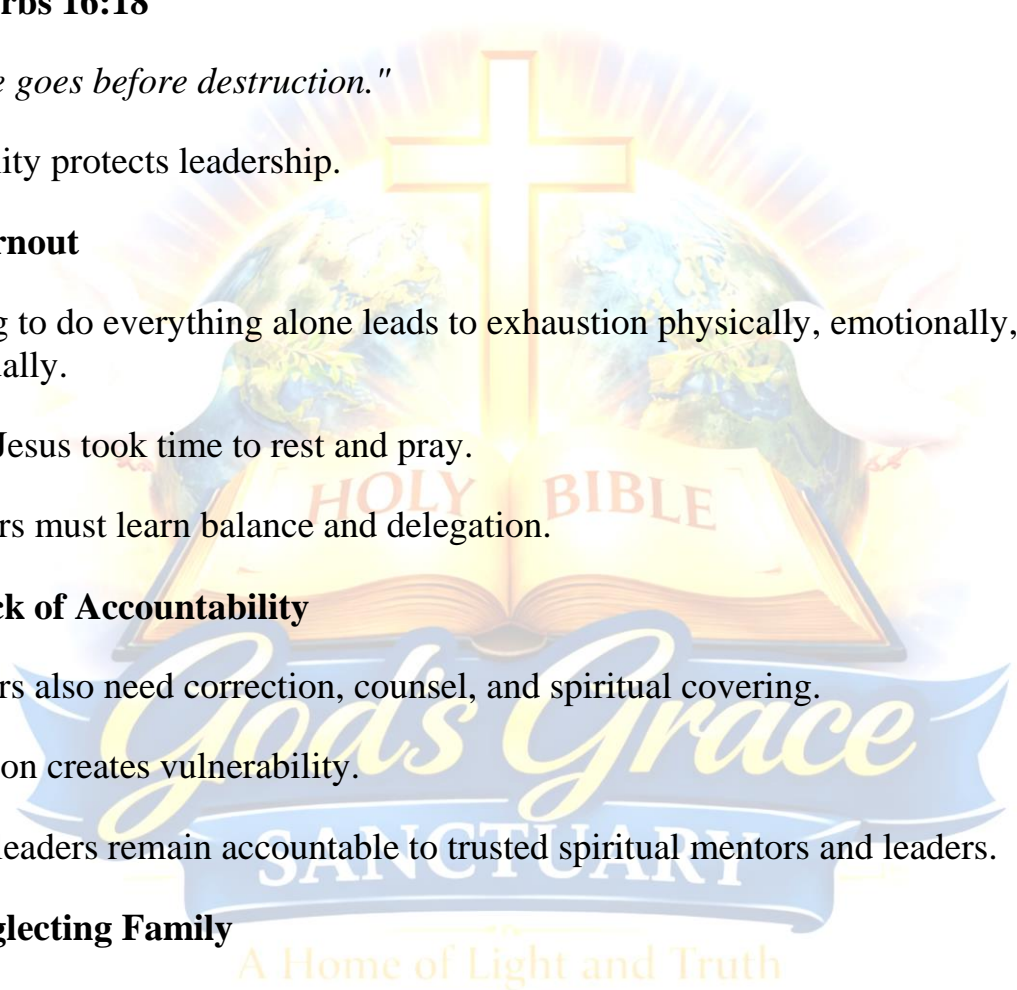
4. Neglecting Family
